Get into the Spring of Things

It's no secret that North Coast Co-op has a stellar selection of natural and environmentally friendly cleaning products for both home and personal use. But sometimes it's fun to look outside the usual products and discover clever new uses for everyday items.



Many people rely on Dr. Bronner's soaps for personal care, but the Castile soap is particularly versatile. You can

add a few tablespoons to 2 cups of hot water to efficiently clean your stove and surrounding areas. Add a tablespoon of Castile soap to 1/3 cup of baking soda to make your own scrubbing paste for bathroom fixtures. You can even add the soap to warm water, using about a 1/4 cup for every two gallons, and use the mixture to mop your floors!

Essential oils can also be used for cleaning. Continuing with our lemon theme, lemon oil can be wiped on shower doors every two weeks to help prevent buildup (and make your bathroom smell lovely!). Have a brush or comb that needs some cleaning? Mix 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups of water with $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of distilled vinegar and 20 drops of tea tree, lavender, or eucalyptus oil, and soak your brush for 20 minutes before rinsing.



Another common household item with super (cleaning) powers is cooking oil. Combining coconut oil

with baking soda gives you a paste that will remove stickers and any residual goo. Vegetable oil mixed with coarse salt is a perfect scrubbing solution for your cast iron pans—just rinse with hot water. Have some wicker furniture that's looking a little dry? Grab some sunflower oil and rub it in with a soft cloth.



Lemons are perhaps one of the most exciting things you can use for some light cleaning projects. They're fresh and bright smelling, and available all year. Rub some fresh lemon juice into a stained cutting board to help lift the discoloration. Mix lemon juice with cream of tartar to make a paste, then scrub it into grout to remove tough stains. Lime scale left on faucets can be removed by leaving lemon juice on taps overnight—simply rinse with a wet cloth in the morning!

February Board Meeting Recap

The February board meeting began with a member comment period, as usual. Improvements to the Arcata store parking lot were appreciated and one member mentioned that he had been getting positive feedback from store employees regarding feeling comfortable coming to board meetings. We are striving to keep communication open amongst members, staff and the board and we greatly appreciate your participation in meetings.

Next we headed into discussion of the Board–Management retreat. Plans are in the works to have a retreat geared toward collaboration between the board of directors and the Co-op management team. Rodger James has agreed to facilitate the retreat, which will lay the foundation for strategic planning and integration of the strategic plan and the Co-op's values into Co-op operations. The date and venue have not been set at this time.

Co-op staff is proposing a change to the schedule for *Co-op News* publication from monthly to quarterly. It will save money and time, which will allow for the publications to be more in-depth and have more content. There will still be monthly board updates available electronically and posted in stores.

General Manager Melanie Bettenhausen gave an update on the Deli remodel for the Eureka store (proposal for approval at March 2 board meeting). Many changes have been made since the original plan and zero waste goals are being built into the plans. There will be more opportunities for customers to bring their own containers to be filled as well as having reusable plates for customers to use in the store. Structural changes are also planned that will help encourage and inform more customers to utilize the Bulk and Produce departments to the fullest extent possible.

James Kloor joined us as a candidate to fill the board vacancy left by Dave Feral. Board members asked James a series of questions and James was also given the opportunity to ask questions of the board. We concluded the regular meeting with a member comment period. Dave Feral shared that on March 25 there will be a World Water Rising event at the Blue Lake Casino to raise awareness and money to go into grant funding water protection response, and asks for the Co-op to support the event. We moved to executive session and reported out that James Kloor was chosen to fill the board vacancy.

As always, we hope to see you at the next board or committee meeting. This recap is not a comprehensive summary of the meeting, if you would like to read the minutes for a more detailed meeting summary you may request them at Customer Service, or find them on the website. Please let us know if there is a way we can support your engagement in the Co-op. The Co-op is a democracy—participate!

s you may know, the Annual Seed A and Plant Exchange is coming up on March 26. This year will be our 18th year in bringing free seeds and plants to many families who need subsistence in order to meet their daily food intake needs. The Humboldt Permaculture Guild exists to implement the goals of permaculture in the redwood bioregion through providing education and action, demonstrating that sustainable, ecologically-based communities can provide a rich and healthy livelihood, promoteing cultural and biological diversity, and encouraging environmental and economic harmony in the places we live

The Seed and Plant Exchange provides an opportunity for the community to come together to educate and provide workshops and seed saving techniques to better ensure food security and success throughout our region. By providing knowledge of seed saving, we are making a commitment to being good stewards of seeds, to realize the importance of seeds, and protecting our organic and heirloom seed varieties. By providing an event that supports local farmers and small cooperatives that donate GMO-free, heirloom varieties of organic seeds, we are ensuring that food security is being addressed in our diverse community.

As a seed saver, I currently have a ded-



icated refrigerated system just to ensure quality seeds for the future for my family and community. Not everyone has such an opportunity; however, with persistence and dedication we can all have the chance to learn and grow in the seed saving knowledge in order to provide for our future food security.

This year, we will be providing workshops on seed saving techniques, soil, and climate and planting practices. Local famers and gardeners will be providing a rich and complete variety of techniques that fit our diverse and biodiverse region.

The Road to Zero Waste

In the January issue of the *Co-op News*, we wrote about the efforts we are making to becoming a zero waste business, and about what we learned by attending a Zero Waste Business Council (ZWBC) meeting. We also surveyed the membership to help us decide whether we should get zero waste business certification; we are currently at approximately 87% waste diversion, and we would have to reach a minimum of 90% to get certified. The survey results were quite interesting—there are some things we can all agree on, and some ideas that will clearly require much more consideration.

Of the 31 responses, 15 members thought we should absolutely become zero waste certified through the ZWBC. Many pointed out that by paying to become certified, we are helping support their efforts to help other businesses reach zero waste. Others pointed out that often, having a third party involved can be beneficial in general. Another thought was that it would help support our zero waste stance in terms of public education.

The remainder of the responses were either ambivalent or indicated that we should not pay for the certification. There were many comments that we could put those funds to better use elsewhere, such as into efforts to directly help us reach zero waste. Some people did not see any benefit to the Co-op or its members in certification. Others mentioned that we seemed to be making great strides toward zero waste on our own, and that certification was an unnecessary expense.

The general consensus of all the responses was that zero waste is absolutely a worthy goal to be actively working toward. One member mentioned that they are happy to support a business that is so dedicated to reaching zero waste.

While it seems the topic of certification is still up for discussion, we will continue to make changes within the Co-op to work toward zero waste. It's a goal that's very important to us all, and we appreciate our members' support in our efforts!

For many of us, this is the season of cleaning and organizing. For others, this is a time to get our hands dirty and our raised beds filled. The days are getting longer, change is in the air, and an extra spring is in our step (see what I did there?).

We are excited to share some unique cleaning products and tips in this issue of the *Co-op News*, in hopes that they will help your world shine a little brighter, and might even streamline your stash of cleaning products. But spring cleaning is about so much more than dusting your coffee table. We at the Co-op have been working hard on simplifying and revitalizing some things we hold dear, and we are excited to share these things with you!

As mentioned in the February *Co-op News*, we have spent the last several months reevaluating what local means to us and our member-owners. Until now, a local product has been anything grown or produced within a 250-mile driving distance from either of our stores. After much

listening, consideration, and discussion, we are excited to announce that as of March 1, that definition is changing.

Our new official local area includes only Humboldt, Trinity and Del Norte counties. To be considered local, the company/ producer/farmer must meet at least one of the following criteria: 1) be owned within the defined area, 2) be operated within the defined area, or 3) be produced within the defined area. After thorough research and information gathering, we were delighted to determine that we carry products from over 190 different local vendors, growers, and producers. Wow!

Throughout the month of March, you will see the stores transform as we roll out our new definition of local. We have a beautiful new local logo, which will grace the shelves and help you find the products made within your community. We will be posting information about local growers throughout the store, and celebrating the vibrant local food system we are blessed to have.

In February, we were proud to connect with our local vendors in a variety of ways. As usual, we hosted our annual farmer meetings; these meetings are individual sit-downs with each farmer to discuss and plan out their supply of produce for the coming year. Keep an eye out in the April *Co-op News* for more details. We also hosted a Local Vendor Meeting, where over 30 local businesses came together to hear about some exciting new support programs we have to offer, and to discuss how the Co-op can better connect our shoppers and our vendors. Stay tuned—there are some fun things in the works!

The other thing we're very excited to unveil is a change to our beloved *Co-op News*. Starting in April, with our 100th issue, the *Co-op News* will move to a quarterly schedule. Fear not, *Co-op News* reader—this does not mean you'll receive less information from your co-op. Instead, the *Co-op News* will take on a brighter, more visual, longer format, chock-a-block full of engaging and useful articles, recipes, resources, and more. Cooperative Community Fund Granting Ceremony

On Thursday, January 26, North Coast Co-op hosted the annual Cooperative Community Fund granting ceremony luncheon to congratulate and present checks to representatives of 15 local non-profits who were awarded funds this year. The recipients shared information about their projects and the ways the projects will impact the community. The projects ranged from feeding the elderly to supporting school gardens. In addition, the Cooperative Community Fund committee chose to support the LatinoNet Health Fair, the Intertribal Gathering, and other projects (see a full list below).

Cooperative Community Fund Mission The Cooperative Community Fund is a permanent endowment established and directed by member-owners of North Coast Co-op, which awards grants to support projects and the work of community organizations in Humboldt County. Through collaborative grant making, the Cooperative Community Fund seeks to strengthen the community by emphasizing projects and activities that promote democratic cooperative principles, community development and food security.

Co-op shoppers contribute to the Cooperative Community Fund every time they pay 10 cents for a paper bag, and by donating at the registers through the Community Round Up program. Shoppers can choose to round up their grocery bill total to the next whole dollar amount, and donate any additional amount they choose. The Community Round Up program is a simple and easy way for shoppers to donate. Even small amounts, when pulled together, can make a big difference! The more shoppers choose to round up their purchase amount, the more we can give back to the community together. In 2016, we collected \$9,914.90 from paper bag sales and \$1,542.94 from the Community Round Up program; next time you're at the register, just say, "Round it up, please!"

North Coast Co-op's Cooperative Community Fund awarded \$12,530 to 15 local non-profits this year and allocated an additional \$7,430 for the Co-op Pumpkin Patch educational farm tours, awarding a grand total of \$19,960! It is only through the generous contributions of our community that we can continue to fund these many worthy grant applicants.

This year's Cooperative Community Fund check ceremony was held at the Ten Pin Building in Arcata, where guests feasted on homemade pumpkin soup, salad, and an assortment of local breads and cheeses, and ended on a sweet note with locally made craft chocolate donated by Dick Taylor Chocolate.

A goal of this committee is to grow the fund so we are able to grant all the requests we receive. We welcome community donations and involvement. Golden Turmeric Paste

Turmeric, in root, powder and paste form, has been used in folk medicine and ceremonies for centuries all over the world. As an external medicine, Turmeric can be used as an antiseptic to cleanse wounds and stimulate the healing of cuts, burns and bruises. In the practice of Ayurvedic medicine, turmeric is considered a universal healer having properties that can strengthen many areas of the body, from respiration to digestion. Whether you have been taking a turmeric supplement for years or you are a novice at trying it outside of savory cooking, consider whipping up this base for a comforting beverage while the nights are still cool and cozy.

Golden Turmeric Paste

- 1 cup filtered water
- 2 knobs of turmeric root, grated
- 1 knob of ginger root, grated
- 1 Tablespoon cinnamon

6 black peppercorns1 teaspoon nutmeg3 teaspoons coconut oil

COOK & SAVE

To make Golden Milk,

add one Tablespoon of paste to warmed milk or

milk alternative. Sweeten

with honey, agave or

sugar to your liking.

Directions

- 1. Bring filtered water to boil in small stock pot.
- 2. Add grated turmeric, ginger and peppercorns to boiling water.
- 3. Reduce heat and simmer for 10 minutes.
- 4. Strain and add golden liquid back into the stock pot.
- 5. Stir in cinnamon, nutmeg and coconut oil.
- 6. Continue to simmer on low until mixture is a thick paste, 15 to 20 minutes.
- 7. Pour paste into heat sturdy glass jars with lids and allow to cool to room temp.
- 8. Store in the fridge for up to three weeks, if you don't use it all first!
